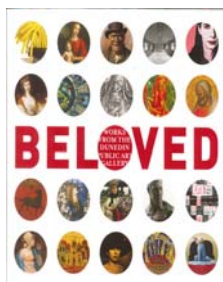

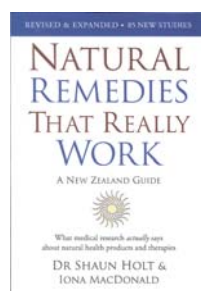

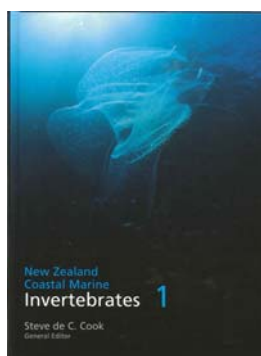

New Zealand Coastal Marine Invertebrates: Volume1

Steve de C. Cook



The first of 2 volumes of a full-colour identification guide to 1500 species of marine invertebrate found around the coasts of New Zealand, this book is intended for divers and naturalists as well as professional scientists.

Sections on each major taxonomic group - e.g. starfishes, crustaceans and molluscs - describe in plain language each animal's morphology, habitat, abundance, distribution, depth range and commercial importance, and introduce and scientific literature.

More than 2500 illustrations include colour photos by New Zealand's best underwater photographers, and hundreds of line drawings for extra anatomical detail. Also included are references, a comprehensive glossary, a full index and a general introduction.

Quite the largest and most comprehensive zoological book ever published in New Zealand, it provides access to a tremendous volume of material hitherto buried in the scientific literature.

Tangata Whenua: Face to Face: Two Cultures Meet in Aotearoa

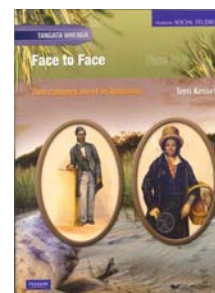

Native Men Remade: Gender and Nation in Contemporary Hawai'i

Ty P. Kawika Tengan

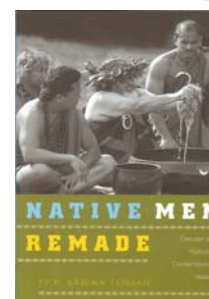
Many indigenous Hawaiian men have felt profoundly disempowered by the legacies of colonisation and by the tourist industry, which, in addition to occupying a great deal of land, promotes a feminised image of Native Hawaiians (evident in the ubiquitous figure of the dancing hula girl). In the 1990s a group of Native men on the island of Maui responded by refashioning and reasserting their masculine identities in a group called the Hale Mua (the 'Men's House').

As a member and an ethnographer, Ty P. Kawika Tengan analyses how its mostly middle-aged, middle-class, and mixed-race members assert a warrior masculinity through practices including martial arts, wood-carving, and cultural ceremonies. Some of their practices are heavily influenced by or borrowed from other indigenous Polynesian traditions, including Maori. The men of Hale Mua enact their refashioned identities as they participate in temple rites, protest marches, public lectures, and cultural fairs. The sharing of personal stories is an integral part of Hale Mua fellowship, and Tengan's account is filled with members' first-person narratives. At the same time, he explains how Hale Mua rituals and practices connect to broader projects of cultural revitalisation and Hawaiian nationalism. He explores class status anxieties expressed through the sharing of individual life stories, critiques of the Hale Mua registered by Hawaiian women, and challenges the group received in dialogues with other indigenous Polynesians.

Native Men Remade is the fascinating story of how gender, culture, class, and personality intersect as a group of indigenous Hawaiian men work to overcome the dislocations of colonial history.

Ritual Communication examines how people create and express meaning through verbal and non-verbal ritual. Ritual communication extends beyond collective religious expression. It is an intrinsic part of everyday interactions, ceremonies, theatrical performances, shamanic chants, political demonstrations and rites of passage.

Despite being largely formulaic and repetitive, ritual communication is a highly participative and self-oriented process. The ritual is shaped by time, space and the individual body as well as by language ideologies, local aesthetics, contexts of use, and relations among participants.

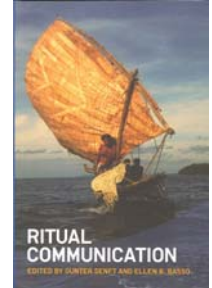
Ritual Communication draws on a wide range of contemporary cultures - from Africa, America, Asia, and the Pacific - to present a rich and diverse study for students and scholars of anthropology, sociology and sociolinguistics.

LOCAL HISTORY

Every Day is a Holiday in New Zealand

Foss Leach et al

This is the story of James and Catherine Leach, who left the industrial north of England and settled in the rural southern Wairarapa New Zealand in 1909.

James became the blacksmith for Waiorongomai sheep Station. James' story began in the West Riding of Yorkshire, at a little town called Bingley where Leach families had lived for more than 400 years before him. His ancestry can be traced from parish records without a break to William Leach c. 1559 and by deeds on parchment to Sir Roger Leche, a hero of Agincourt c. 1405, and thence to John Leche, Physician to Edward III, c. 1356.

Catherine's family, the Calpins and Maloneys, came from Crossmolina and Attymass in County Mayo in Ireland.

They were poor tenant farmers and cottiers and the appalling conditions of the Great Famine from 1840-1850 drove members of these families to seek work in the woollen mills of Bingley. Although they avoided the plight of so many who died in the famine the working conditions of late 19th century Bingley offered little prospects of advancement, so James and Catherine decided to emigrate to New Zealand.

Their new life was such that James was often heard to say "every day is a holiday in New Zealand". James and Catherine worked hard to give their five children a good education.

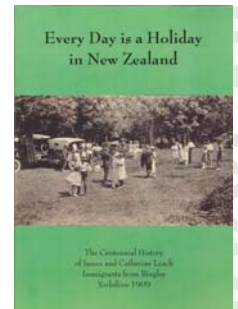
The book follows the diverse and fruitful lives of those children, who were always united by a strong sense of family.

The cargo and passenger vessels recorded in this book have provided regular and scheduled services across Cook Strait since the late 19th century, establishing and maintaining the vital link between Wellington and the South Island ports of Lyttelton, Picton and Nelson.

Many will forever be a part of our nation's history. Most are forgotten in time. Described are the ships that, year after year, in war and peace, carried our commerce and families between north and south.

They were our maritime 'household names'. Ships like the Tamahine, Hinemoa, Aramoana, the giant Kaitaki, and the pioneering Straitsman are among those featured in text and photos.

Profiles recall crew and passenger memories, outline the ports, detail the historic 'boat trains', visit the loss of the Wahine and acknowledge the assistance of the harbour radio stations.

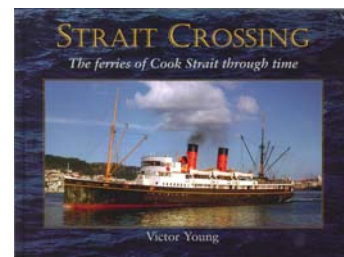

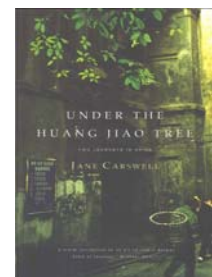
Under the Huang Jiao Tree is a reflective, amusing and absorbing book about living and working in China, and the profound impact the experience has on the author's search for connection and community.

On her return to her Western life she becomes drawn to the teachings of St Benedict, and all at once the reader realises where the purity of her writing springs from: a deep well of calm, silence and belief.

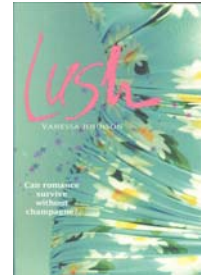

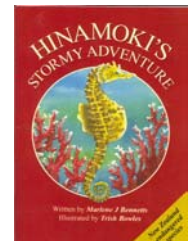
