





His admirers said he was a charismatic leader with a dazzling smile, a commoner following an ancient tradition of warrior service on behalf of an indigenous people who feared marginalisation at the hands of ungrateful immigrants. One tourist pleaded with him to stage a coup in her backyard; in private parties around the capital, Suva, infatuated women whispered coup me baby in his presence. It was so easy to overlook the enormity of what he had done in planning and implementing Fiji's first military coup, to be seduced by celebrity, captivated by the excitement of the moment, and plead its inevitability as the final eruption of long-simmering indigenous discontent.


A generation would pass before the consequences of the actions of Fiji's strongman of 1987, Sitiveni Rabuka, would be fully appreciated but, by then, the die had been well and truly cast. The major general did not live happily ever after. No nirvana followed the assertion of indigenous rights. If anything, misadventure became his country's most enduring contemporary trait. This is Fiji's very human story.

Other New Zealand universities did not establish professionally recognised schools and programmes in these disciplines until the 1970s. In 1966 Michael Illingworth, whose oil painting *Adam and Eve* appears on the front cover of this book, was awarded the inaugural Frances Hodgkins Fellowship. For the first time in New Zealand a practicing artist was given a studio and paid a salary to make art for a whole year. Such support, as Frances Hodgkins herself wrote from her own experience, was capable of 'yielding up riches - undreamed of'.

Poet and critic David Eggleton has described the fellowship as 'an emblem of cultural endeavour which ... 'holds a legendary status in the public imagination'.



The initiative and much of the early funding for the fellowship is thought to have come from poet, editor and arts patron Charles Brasch, and it was set up by the University of Otago Council. Fifty years later, the Frances Hodgkins is still going strong, one of five arts fellowships offered through the University of Otago's Humanities Division.

This sumptuous book brings together the art and the stories of half a century of Frances Hodgkins fellows. Arts commentator Priscilla Pitts writes about their work, while journalist Andrea Hotere interviews the artists about their lives and sources of inspiration.





Risking Their Lives : New Zealand Abortion Stories 1900-1939

Margaret Sparrow

Risking Their Lives is the third book in a series recording the history of abortion in New Zealand. It fills the gap between *Abortion Then and Now: New Zealand Abortion Stories from 1940 to 1980* and *Rough on Women: Abortion in 19th-Century New Zealand*.

Abortion has always been a fraught political issue in New Zealand, from the draconian laws of the 1860s, when most abortions were illegal and clandestine and society's emphasis was on punishment, to the turbulent abortion rights protests of the 1970s. In the early years of the 20th century, abortion came to be recognised not just as a crime but also as a major public health problem. In response to an embarrassingly large number of deaths from septic abortion, the government in 1936 appointed a Committee of Inquiry to investigate the issues.

This was a turning point in people's attitudes to abortion and women's reproductive health in general.

Risking Their Lives features many previously untold stories salvaged from the coroners reports and newspaper reports of the day. The narrative is grim, but this is an honest retelling of our past, primarily letting the stories speak for themselves. As those who fought to make abortion safer and easier for women grow older and there are fewer people who remember what it used to be like, such stories become increasingly important to ensure that history does not repeat itself.

Dame Margaret Sparrow has had a long career in general and reproductive health. In 1987 she was awarded an MBE, in 1993 she received the New Zealand Suffrage Centennial Medal and in 2002 was awarded the DCNZM for services to medicine and the community.

Describing the idiosyncratic characters of her parents and the many other interesting people in her life, Shelagh writes beautifully and insightfully about her childhood and early adulthood.


She weaves historical events into her personal narrative and remembers the frequent loneliness and struggle in her own life, while observing the world around her with the eye of both a writer and a sociologist.


Disappointingly for my mother, her Ten Toothsome Ways with Gourmet Offal were not a success. We didn't appreciate how lucky we were - she said..."





Man-Made Woman : The Dialectics of Cross-Dressing

Ciara Cremin



On July 27th, 2015, Colin Cremin overcame a lifetime of fear and repression and came to work dressed as a woman called Ciara. Wearing full makeup, a blouse, a black skirt, and pantyhose, Cremin walked down the steps of a lecture theater in front of a hundred seated students and, without comment, gave her lecture as usual.

In *Man-Made Woman*, Cremin charts her personal journey as a male-to-female cross-dresser in the ever-changing world of gender politics.

Interweaving personal narrative with political discourse, *Man-Made Woman* is a vivid exploration of gender, identity, fetishism, aesthetics, and popular culture through the lenses of feminism, Marxism, and psychoanalytic theory. Cremin's anti-moralistic approach dismantles the abjection associated with male-to-female cross dressing, examines the causes of repression, and considers what it means to publicly materialise desire on one's body.

Man-Made Woman is an experiment that ultimately draws both author and reader into a conflict with their material, ideological, and libidinal relationship to patriarchal-capitalism. With an emancipatory and empowering voice, Cremin interrogates her, his, and our relationship to the gender binary.

In light of recent debate surrounding transgender bathroom rights in the United States, *Man-Made Woman* is a deeply personal account that offers timely insight for anyone interested in contemporary trans politics and queer theory.



Rose Ann Dixon's family life in Otara seems unremarkable. Her home, which she shares with her father, mother, and five younger sisters and brothers, along with the family cat - called Hoodat - looks no different from those around it. But, her close friend and neighbours know otherwise.

Each day, Rose faces problems that no one should ever have to deal with, but deep love for her siblings sees her carry out quiet deeds of heroism in the face of increasing anger and violence meted out by her father.

A gift from her thoughtful teacher on her thirteenth birthday is a turning point in Rose's life. After hearing Martin Luther King's inspiring words, she realises that every child can have dreams and what's more they have a right to expect them to come true.

Discovering a family secret gives her newfound strength to confront her distant and ineffective mother about a past event that left lifelong scars which she now sees very differently.

In order to save her siblings, Rose realises she must first abandon them, and begins a journey from Otara to Wellington and finally India. Sustained by the love and wisdom of a recently deceased Aunt and the unending kindness of her best friend Aya's family she learns things about herself and others that enable her to take the actions needed to save her family.

Karen Mills writes a gripping story about family violence with profound understanding and delightful humorous touches.


Thousands flee central Wellington as a far too common once in a century storm descends. Roads are closed and all rail is halted. For their own safety, city workers are told that they must go home early.


The novel's protagonist, Detective Matt Buchanan, unravels as he pieces together the crimes hes trying to solve. Ultimately, it gets too personal, he goes too far, and, as the subtitle suggests, Buchanan descends into darkness.

For Buchanan, the world is a pretty sick place. He has probably been in the job too long, for one thing. And then theres 14-year-old Samantha Coates, and the other unsolved murder cases. Those innocent girls he just cant get out of his head. When Buchanan pursues some fresh leads, it soon becomes clear hes on the trail of something big. As he pieces the horrific crimes together, Buchanan finds the very foundations of everything he once believed in start to crumble. Hes forced across that grey line that separates right and wrong into places so dark, even he might not make it back.

This astonishing novel will grip you and will stay in your head long after youve finished reading it.
